An introduction to the A level course

What you need to do over the summer to achieve a flying start in September

In September your work will revolve around 'Growth and Decay'

Over the holiday you need to take a large range of photographs that represent the topic for you. Take photos in good light from different angles and print them out as contact sheets to use later for reference. Ensure you have the photos saved ready to be used in September.

Complete at least 3 A3 observational drawings in a variety of media in your sketchbook either from real life or from the photos you have taken. You may need to grid out the photo to achieve a really accurate shape. Take your time and look closely to achieve either accurate tone or colour.

Start a personal scrap book/ sketchbook of images you like from magazines, photos and the internet, annotate by noting what attracted you to the image. Add drawings and quick sketches to your sketchbook.

Create a Pinterest account for 'Growth and Decay' and collect images and techniques you might use or like to try.

Choose 2 artists from the PowerPoint and produce artist research and an artist response using your own photos.




What sort of things should I look at?






















Take photos that show texture and detail

Task 1

September.










Task 2

If you go to any Art gallerys or exhibitions over the summer then take your A5 sketchbook with you to record what you see.





Task 4 – 2 Artist research pages and response.







