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OPPORTUNITIES

World Space Week is an international celebration of science and technology, and their contribution to the betterment of the human condition. The United Nations General Assembly declared in 1999 that World Space Week will be held each year from October 4-10. These dates commemorate two events:

- October 4, 1957: Launch of the first human-made Earth satellite, Sputnik 1, thus opening the way for space exploration
- October 10, 1967: The signing of the Treaty on Principles Governing the Activities of States in the Exploration and Peaceful Uses of Outer Space, including the Moon and Other Celestial Bodies.

In this session, NASA Flight Controller Amy Dill will be talking about her experience at Mission Control, what it's like to help astronauts while they are in space, the role of rockets, and what skills are needed to work in the space sector.

Astro Pi Mission Zero is a free, beginner-friendly challenge from ESA and the Raspberry Pi Foundation. In under an hour, participants write a short Python program that displays an image or animation on an Astro Pi computer aboard the International Space Station. The program also reads live data from the Astro Pi's colour and luminosity sensor to set the background colour, so the artwork responds to real conditions in space. No previous coding experience is needed, and no physical kit is required.

Space - the final frontier, now closer in reach than ever before. Companies worldwide are looking to the skies with the hope of exploring, and being one of the leading stars in the space sector. But, what do they need to get there, and how does the Civil Aviation Authority come into this? Join this Sprint with the Civil Aviation Authority, and use your skills to understand the process of preparing a spacecraft launch licence application, and, with the help of expert professionals, you'll understand key aspects around exploring space.

In this captivating Subject Spotlight, Paul Sant presents: Computer Science: Space explanation, AI and beyond. He explains what computer science is, fundamental skills for a computer scientist and how computer science has revolutionised industry. Paul then talks about why AI is the future for learning, considers the failings of AI, and discusses the impact of AI on society in the modern age. Paul discusses the role of computer science in the fascinating case study of the Mars Rover, which failed and crashed in 1999.

Planetary Scientist

A planetary scientist studies the origin, evolution, and physical characteristics of planets, moons, asteroids, and other bodies in the solar system. To access this role, you often need to earn an undergraduate degree in physics, geology, astronomy, chemistry, or planetary science. You will need strong abilities in mathematics, computer programming, data analysis, and scientific problem-solving.
